MSc Forensic Psychology

1. Introduction

As a well-established course, the MSc Forensic Psychology at Coventry University will provide students with a thorough grounding in the theory, themes, issues and practical skills central to forensic psychological practice and the settings in which it is applied. The course is designed to cover the British Psychological Society's Division of Forensic Psychology's (DFP) core curriculum, covering diverse topics such as the theoretical basis of forensic psychology across a range of settings justice process, i.e. from investigation to punishment and through care, and risk assessment and the associated risk management of offenders as well as , coverage of legal approaches relevant to psychology.

As part of this course students will undertake a professional development module which is currently accredited by the Chartered Management Institute (CMI). Upon successful completion of the module, students will gain the CMI Level 7 Certificate in Strategic Management and Leadership Practice at no additional cost.

The professional development module will develop key skills that are transferable to a future career in the forensic psychology arena. Alongside this curriculum, students on this course will also develop a range of globally relevant practice-based transferable skills including: effective communication and dissemination, criticality, reflection, synthesis, and evaluation of ethical issues. As such, this course fulfils Stage 1 requirements towards becoming a Chartered Psychologist and obtaining Full Membership of the Division of Forensic Psychology in the British Psychological Society. Taught by staff with extensive professional psychological experience, either as Chartered/HCPC registered Members themselves and/or as active researchers, the MSc Forensic Psychology is part of a suite of postgraduate forensic psychology courses that can be studied at Coventry University. As indicated by its accreditation, this course is primarily for those who wish continue in a career associated with forensic psychology in a range of settings (e.g., with victims, practitioners), without specialising at this point, or for those who wish to undertake an accredited programme before determining their future career trajectory. Specifically, this course will develop a broad overview of forensic psychology as a whole and the settings relevant to this work, so that students can determine a future career trajectory based on their experience of the course curriculum and skill development. The course can be taken as a Full-Time course over one year, which involves attendance to a traditional campus based course. However, the course is also offered Part-Time over two years through an online learning approach. This version of the course provides flexibility and part-time continuing professional development, potentially (but not limited to) practitioners who are already working in forensic psychology settings. Staff have considerable experience in delivering high quality online provision and understand how online learning is substantially different when compared with face to face courses.

12 Outline and Educational Aims of the Course

The key educational aims of the course are to:

- Develop the understanding, skills, and confidence of learners needed to become Forensic Psychologists and/or for employment in associated fields
- Provide students with exemption from the Stage 1 of the process of becoming a Chartered Psychologist
- Develop learners' skills and competencies (e.g., critical reflection) that can be applied across a range of forensic settings.
- Provide learning environments that enable learners to develop and apply knowledge and skills relevant to their future practice in global forensic settings.

13 Course Learning Outcomes

A student who successfully completes the course will have achieved the following Course Learning Outcomes.

- 1. Demonstrate a comprehensive knowledge and critical understanding of how psychology can be applied to a range of criminal justice, legal and forensic settings, and client groups.
- 2. Demonstrate competence in applying psychological knowledge and skills (e.g., critical evaluation) to practicebased scenarios in forensic psychology.
- 3. Demonstrate reflective and critical understanding of themselves as future practitioners.
- 4. Demonstrate and consolidate a range of transferable and professional skills that are applicable to a range of forensic practice settings.
- 5. Demonstrate a critical understanding of psychological research paradigms, research methods, ethical procedures, data analyses, psychological literature evidence and theory.
- 6. To be able to critically evaluate the principles for leading and developing people and a culture of organisational health and wellbeing.

14 Course Structure and Requirements, Levels, Modules, Credits and Awards

All modules on the MSc Forensic Psychology are mandatory. During the course, students study a range of modules that carry credits from 10 - 40 credits, and then complete a 40-credit dissertation.

For an MSc award students are required to complete 180 credits, including the 40-credit dissertation.

Students who achieve a total of 120 credits can be awarded a Postgraduate Diploma in Forensic Psychology, but this must include 40 credits from either 7066PY, 7067PY, and 7068PY. Students who achieve a total of 60 credits can be awarded a Postgraduate Certificate in Forensic Psychology, but this must include 20 credits from either 7066PY, 7067PY, and 7068PY.

Students begin the course with a 40 credit module (7057PY - Ethical Research and Methods in Forensic Psychology) to enable them to continue to develop their knowledge of research methods and importantly, begin their development of their dissertation project and ethics application.

All modules are mandatory and no modules are condonable within this course. Graduates must achieve the necessary 50% pass mark for all modules contributing to the accredited MSc degree (BPS Standards for the Accreditation of the Masters Programme in Forensic Psychology and Crime MSc, October 2017).

Graduates who do not meet this requirement will exit with a non-accredited award **MSc Forensic Psychology Studies.** To achieve the necessary number of credits for all non-accredited awards, graduates must achieve the necessary 40% pass mark for all modules contributing to the award.

Students who successfully complete this module will be awarded Foundation Chartered Manager status and be able to use the designation 'fCMgr' after their name.

15 Criteria for Admission and Selection Procedure

Applicants should hold the equivalent of a minimum 2:2 undergraduate degree in Psychology. Consideration will be given to applicants who hold the equivalent of a minimum 2:2 undergraduate degrees in Science or Social Sciences, where a minimum of 50% of undergraduate study is in Psychology with evidence of studying curriculum including research methods.

Applicants whose first language is not English should have an IELTS 6.5 overall, with no component lower than 5.5. Pre-sessional English is available if required.

Recognition of Prior Learning

Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL)/Recognition of Experiential Learning (RPEL) shall be in accordance with University Regulations. Prior learning shall only be recognised at the point of admission to the course and shall not be given for more than two thirds of any course.

17 Indicators of Quality Enhancement

The course is managed by the Psychological, Social and Behavioural Sciences Board of Study of the Faculty of Health and Life Sciences.

The Progression and Awards Board (PAB) for Psychological, Social and Behavioural Sciences is responsible for considering the progress of all students and making awards in accordance with both the University and course-specific regulations.

The assurance of the quality of modules is the responsibility of the Boards of Study which contribute modules to the course.

External Examiners report annually on the course and their views are considered as part of the annual quality monitoring process (CQEM). Details of the CQEM process can be found on the Registry's website.

Students are represented on the Student Forum, Board of Study and Faculty/School Board, all of which normally meet two or three times per year.

Student views are also sought through module and course evaluation questionnaires.
