AIMS OF THE DOCUMENT

The aims of this document are to:

AIMS OF THE PROGRAMME

The programme emphasises the necessity of both technical and soft skill sets in successfully managing audio-visual productions, and students will develop and demonstrate both across their coursework and assessment artefacts.

Management techniques for both scripted and non-scripted content will be critically analysed and practically explored through the management of collaborative student productions.

ALIGNMENT WITH THE UNIVERSITY'S STRATEGIC PLAN

This programme is informed by and aligned with the BU 2025 strategic plan and fusion ethos to inspire learning, advance knowledge and enrich society through the fusion of education, research and practice. The BU 2025 values of excellence, inclusivity, creativity and responsibility are woven throughout the programme.

LEARNING HOURS AND ASSESSMENT

Bournemouth University taught programmes are composed of units of study, which are assigned a credit value indicating the amount of learning undertaken. The minimum credit value of a unit is normally 20 credits, above which credit values normally increase at 20-point intervals. 20 credits is the equivalent of 200 study hours required of the student, including lectures, seminars, assessment and independent study. 20 University credits are equivalent to 10 European Credit Transfer System (ECTS) credits.

The assessment workload for a unit should consider the total time devoted to study, including the assessment workload (i.e. formative and summative assessment) and the taught elements and independent study workload (i.e. lectures, seminars, preparatory work, practical activities, reading, critical reflection).

Assessment per 20 credit unit should normally consist of 3,000 words or equivalent. Dissertations and Level 6 and 7 Final Projects are distinct from other assessment types. The word count for these assignments is 5,000 words per 20 credits, recognising that undertaking an in-depth piece of original research as the capstone to a degree is pedagogically sound.

Students will usually be taught by a combination of senior academic staff with others who have relevant expertise including – where appropriate according to the content of the unit – academic staff, qualified professional practitioners, demonstrators/technicians and research students.

ADMISSION REGULATIONS

The regulations for this programme are the University's Standard Undergraduate Admission Regulations with the following amendments:

- 1. Applicants whose mother tongue is not English must offer evidence of qualifications in written and spoken English. Acceptable qualifications are:
 - IELTS (academic) 6.0 (with a minimum of 5.5 in each of four categories) <u>or</u> TOEFL (paper-based) 575 (with a minimum of 48 in each of three categories and an essay rating of at least 4) <u>or</u> TOEFL (internet-based) 90 with a minimum of 22 in each element, or direct equivalent.
- Applicants from Bournemouth University International College programmes which have approved articulation routes must meet the minimum entry requirements in terms of course average and English requirements as stipulated by the Faculty of Media and Communication at Bournemouth University.

PROGRESSION ROUTES

Students who have successfully completed an undergraduate degree in a related subject at Bournemouth University, and IELTS at 6.0 with no lower than 5.5 in each separate sub-element, will be automatically accepted for entry to the MA Post Production Editing.

In order to take advantage of exciting new approaches to learning and teaching, as well as developments in industry, the current, approved Articulation route for this programme may be subject to change. Where this happens, students will be informed and supported by the Faculty as early as possible.
